The following is an update on several of the many community issues that Councilmember Menor has been working on:

West Loch Elderly Village

Councilmember Menor was contacted by State Representative Bob McDermott who reported that the areas fronting the West Loch Elderly Village had become overgrown. Councilmember Menor submitted a Request for Investigation and Service Report requesting the City to remove the overgrowth.

The Department of Facility Maintenance was able to secure the necessary funding to clear the parcel of land in question and completed the work in early July.

Ewa Battlefield Maintenance

Councilmember Menor recently met with
American Veterans Hawaii Commander
Donovan Lazarus and Director John Bond
to discuss the maintenance of the Ewa
Battlefield site. American Veterans Hawaii
has maintained this parcel of land and
holds its annual Veterans Day ceremony at the Ewa Battlefield. American Veterans
Hawaii has requested permanent access to

the area to be able to maintain it on a more regular basis.

Councilmember Menor has organized a site visit with American Veterans Hawaii and City Department of Parks and Recreation Deputy Director Jeanne Ishikawa to discuss the feasibility of American Veterans Hawaii's request. Councilmember Menor will provide any necessary updates in the future.

The camp's focus is summer fun through leadership development, 21st century skill building, and tools to positively serve and impact the community. guidance and support.





TUA TAGOVAILOA HOMETOWN HERO PARADE

Councilmember Menor recently presented an honorary certificate to University of Alabama quarterback and 'Ewa Beach Hawaii resident Tua Tagovailoa recognizing him for his accomplishments on his way to capturing 2018 College Football Playoff National Championship. The text of the certificate is reproduced below:

born and raised in Ewa Beach, Oahu. From a young age, Tua showed a deep passion for football. His passion for the sport, as well as his skills, were fostered by his grandfather Seu and his father, both of whom played integral roles in his development as a young athlete. Tua attended St. Louis School in Honolulu where he played for storied coach Cal Lee. A three-year starter, he amassed impressive passing statistics, eventually eclipsing Hawaii's all-time records for passing yardage. His high school career culminated in victory, when Tua led the Crusaders to a 30-14 victory against Kahuku High School to capture the 2016 First Hawaiian Bank/HHSAA Open Division Football Championship.

Tua was heavily recruited by powerhouse NCAA football programs around the country. Ultimately, he committed to the University of Alabama to play for head coach Nick Saban. In an interview explaining his decision to attend the University of Alabama, Tua described how similar Tuscaloosa felt to Hawaii and noted that the

residents of Tuscaloosa treated him like family, just as they would in

As a true freshman. Tua primarily played a backup role to starting quarterback Jalen Hurts. He made his collegiate debut at home against the Fresno State Bulldogs and completed his first touchdown pass for the Crimson Tide. Over the course of the season, he accrued The eldest of four children born to parents Diane and Galu, Tua was a significant amount of playing time, taking the field during Alabama's blowout wins. A perennial title contender, Alabama had an outstanding season and was ultimately selected to play in the postseason, where they defeated Clemson University in the Sugar Bowl, 24-6, and advanced to the national championship game.

> On January 8, 2018, the Crimson Tide took the field against the University of Georgia and struggled in the first half. Unable to get their offense going, Alabama headed for the locker room at halftime, trailing 13-0. During halftime, Alabama head coach Nick Saban made the decision to have Tua start the second half. In the fourth quarter, Tua mounted the Tide's comeback, ultimately tying the score at 20 with 3:49 left to play. With neither team able to muster a game-winning score, the game went into overtime. In their first possession, Georgia kicked a field goal, taking a 3-point lead. Two plays later, Tua completed a 41-yard touchdown pass, securing the exciting win for the Crimson Tide.


