UPDATE ON COMMUNITY CONCERNS

The following is an update on several of the many community issues in which Council Chair Menor has been involved: Varona Village

On February 3rd, a representative from Chair Menor's staff attended a Varona Village Community Potluck Meeting that was new obstacles to be installed at the Ewa organized by Varone Village supporter, Agnes Malate. Chair Menor is pleased to announce that the Request for Proposals (RFP) has been posted by the City and now awaits proposals from developers under a competitive bidding process. The deadline for proposals to be submitted is March 31st and the City hopes to have selected a prospective developer after the end of the evaluation period on May 30.

This is a significant step forward in the effort to redevelop Varona Village for its residents. Chair Menor will continue to monitor this issue and will provide necessary updates.

Bus Pass Program

Council Chair Menor organized a meeting between City transportation officials and school administrators to discuss the feasibility of a program that would allow West Oahu students to use their schoolissued ID cards as bus passes to participate in off-campus educational activities. Meeting attendees included James Campbell High School Principal Jon Henry Lee and Vice Principal Shayne Greenland, Kapolei High School Principal Elden Esmerelda, Department of Transportation Services Acting Director Mark Garrity, Department of Transportation Services Deputy Director Jon Nouchi, City Transit Director Eileen Mark, and State of Hawaii Department of Education representative Kristy Nishimura.

The proposed program was modeled after a similar program that has been implemented in Nashville, Tennessee and would give students access to educational opportunities like internships, job shadowing, and would also make possible collaboration between schools with different learning academies.

Several principals including Vice Principal Greenland and Principal Esmerelda will be traveling to Nashville in March and will bring back more information on this program. Chair Menor will continue to support the implementation of programs that benefit area week of February and could be finished by students.

Ewa Beach Skate Park

At its January 25th Council meeting, the

City Council voted to adopt Resolution 17-30 for the City to accept as gifts, materials for the construction of two skateboarding obstacles from the Association of Skateboarders in Hawaii (ASH). Now that the City has adopted this resolution, construction of the Beach Skate Park at Ewa Beach Community Park is slated to begin on February 18th. The construction of the two new obstacles should be completed by the first week of March. Once the obstacles are completed, the City will be able to move forward with the planned resurfacing project.

ASH is looking for both skilled and unskilled labor volunteers who would be interested in helping with the construction of the two obstacles. If you would like to volunteer, please contact ASH at 230-9086 or Chair Menor's office at 768-5009. This project is progressing well and Chair Menor will continue to push for its completion.

West Loch Bike Path

On January 26th, Chair Menor conducted a site visit with members of Hawaii Bicycling League member Daniel Alexander, Executive Director Chad Taniguchi, and West Loch Fairways board member John Rogers who raised a number of concerns about the conditions of the West Loch Shoreline Bike Path. Mr. Rogers pointed out a number of issues including: the lack of adequate maintenance of the landscaping in the area; the need for resurfacing of the bike path in certain areas; an area of the path that is covered in mud due to poor drainage; and the need for repairs to the metal bridge on the path.

Chair Menor has submitted a Request For Investigation and Service Report (RISR) asking the City to address these concerns. He will provide any future updates.

Kuhina Street Bus Stop

Chair Menor is pleased to report that the City will begin its project to replace the bus stop shelter at Fort Weaver Road and Kuhina Street later this month as part of the City's Bus Stop Site Improvements Project. The shelter had been vandalized numerous times and was in need of replacement.

Construction is slated to begin in the third the first week of March. Chair Menor will follow up to make sure that this project is completed.

Described as an open-minded and transformational leader, Ewa Makai Middle School Principal Edward Oshiro retired at the end of 2016 after more than 40 years as an employee of the State of Hawaii Department of Education.

Principal Oshiro's resume as a Department of Education employee is extensive. He spent the first 20 years of his career as a science teacher at Radford High School before focusing his attention on being garnered three diverse awards. He was selected to the 1st edition of a school administrator. In addition to his most recent post as the principal of Ewa Makai Middle School, he previously served as the vice-principal of Waipahu High School and the principal of Waikele Elementary School, Waipahu Intermediate School, Aiea Elementary School, and Makaha Elementary School.

Principal Oshiro has been the principal of Ewa Makai Middle School since the school was established in 2011 and, under his leadership. the school has flourished. Since its establishment, Ewa Makai Middle School has been touted as one of the most technologically advanced schools in the state. Over the last five years, the school has done its utmost to retain that designation. Just last year, Ewa Makai Middle School was named one of the "41 Most Innovative Schools in America" by the educational website, Noodle.com, due to its work to

continually implement technology into the school's curriculum. Moreover, Ewa Makai Middle School has excelled in numerous academic areas with the school receiving full accreditation by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges through the year 2021. For his dedication to his students, Principal Oshiro has been the recipient of numerous awards and commendations. In 1987, he the "Who's Who Among America's Teachers," and received the Outstanding Teacher Award, and the Scott Schuman Award which is presented by the Honolulu Quarterback Club to the outstanding amateur coach of the year for the state. In 2014, he was selected from a group of 13 other exemplary school administrators to be the recipient of the 10th Annual Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award. Another one of his impressive accomplishments is the Leeward District Principal of the Year Award which he received in 2015.
