UPDATE ON COMMUNITY CONCERNS

The following is an update on several of the many community issues that Councilmember Menor has been addressing:

Bill 54 (2018), CD2

At its October 3 meeting, the City Council voted unanimously to adopt Bill 54 (2018), CD2 which formally establishes an age-friendly program within the City and County of Honolulu. This bill further ensures that future City administrations will remain committed to implementing kupuna-friendly projects in an increasingly urban Honolulu environment.

Age-friendly programs were spearheaded by the World Health Organization (WHO) and supported around the country by the AARP. A Honolulu steering committee developed an age-friendly plan which was submitted by Mayor Caldwell and approved by the WHO and AARP. Honolulu is now the ninth city to have its age-friendly plan approved by these organizations.

Mayor Caldwell signed Bill 54 (2018), CD2 into law on October 11.

Bill 64 (2018)

The Council is considering Bill 64 (2018) which will establish an expedited process to obtain building permits for one- and twofamily dwellings. Local homeowners as well as building industry professionals have reported waiting up to a year to obtain building permits from the City. This has resulted in an island-wide situation where construction companies have been forced to lay off workers while waiting for permits. Moreover, homeowners are experiencing

lengthy delays to complete home improvement projects.

This bill will establish a one-time review process and will require the Department of Planning and Permitting to process building permit applications in less than 60 days upon acceptance of the application. Bill 64 (2018) will be considered for adoption at the Council's November 14 meeting.

Holomua Elementary School

Councilmember Menor is pleased to report that traffic delineators have been installed near the entrance of Holomua Elementary School. The traffic delineators were requested by the Holomua Elementary School administration in an effort to increase pedestrian safety. The installation was completed on October 9.

Geiger Road Repaving

At the October meeting of Ewa Neighborhood Board No. 23, Board Member Aki alerted Councilmember Menor to numerous steel plates on Geiger Road between Kapolei Parkway and Kamakana Street. Board Member Aki requested that the City repave these sections of the road as the steel plates have made the road difficult to navigate.

Councilmember Menor submitted a Request for Investigation and Service Report (RISR) requesting more information. It has been determined that the steel plates are not part of a City project but rather a Hawaii Gas project. Councilmember Menor has contacted Hawaii Gas for further clarification and to request that the steel plates be removed and the road be repaved.
