LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Councilmember Tulba is Chair of the Committee for Parks and Community Service, Vice Chair of Public Safety, and a voting member on the Committees on Housing and Economy: Executive Matters and Legal Affairs; and Transportation, Sustainability and Health. Here are some issues that he and his staff are tackling on the legislative side:

Resolution 21-102 (2021)

Approves the Ala Moana Neighborhood Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) Plan.

Resolution 21-77 (2021)

Requests that the City Administration develop a stream maintenance schedule for City-owned streams and non-stream drainage infrastructure.

Resolution 21-103 (2021)

Requests the City Administration to evaluate for compliance with Act 73, Session Laws of Hawaii 2020, the eleven sites previously identified by City studies as potential replacements for the Waimanalo Gulch Sanitary Landfill and additional potential Waimanalo Gulch Sanitary Landfill replacement sites, including lands held by the State Department of Hawaiian Home Lands in Kalaeloa and other former federal lands that were not previously evaluated, as appropriate.

Resolution 21-102 (2021)

Urges the City Administration to assess the City's capability to implement a construction and demolition debris recycling program and estimate the amount of revenue that may be generated annually by the sale of recycled construction and demolition debris.

Bill 18 (2021)

Requires notice on certain roadways near the entrance of hiking trails warning that parking is prohibited in front of a public or private driveway or within four feet of either side of a public or private driveway.

Bill 87 (2020), CD1

Proposes a fare increase for all paratransit riders from \$2.00 to \$2.25.

ISSUES ARISING IN DISTRICT 9

Aaron Ho District 9 Community Liaison

Aaron Ho, our office's Community Liaison, is touring District 9 with Councilmember Tulba to learn about community concerns related to city operations, property and crime. Here are some of the issues in District 9 that he is working on:



Kuhina Street Improvements

Area residents have contacted Honolulu City Councilmember Augie Tulba's office expressing concern about drivers speeding on Kuhina Street. They requested that the Department of Transportation Services install speed mitigations along Kuhina Street. To get this accomplished, the City must receive a petition indicating that a significant majority of property owners on Kuhina Street - 90% or more - are in favor.

Roadside Maintenance on Keahumoa Parkway

Keahumoa Parkway in Ewa Beach needs landscaping and other maintenance. According to a resident, this well-used thoroughfare is rarely maintained and the grass is encroaching on sidewalks. At 'Elepu'u Street, the grass completely obscures a bus stop bench. At the intersection of Keahumoa Parkway and Lakona Street, a large utility cover panel is broken and laying in the middle of the sidewalk posing a potential hazard for pedestrians. Our office is in touch with the City's Department of Facility Maintenance and awaiting a response.

Roadway issues at Nanaulu Street in Ewa Beach

There is a square-shaped area behind a barrier on Nanaulu Street that appears to be sinking, according to an area resident. There also are a number of abandoned trucks, which our office reported to the City Administration and the Department of Facility Maintenance for further action. In addition, there are a number of illegally parked vehicles along the alreadybuilt stretch of Nanaulu Street, which have expired registrations or safety check tabs. Our office has reached out to the Honolulu Police Department to increase enforcement.

Street light issues on Nanaulu Street in Ewa Beach

There is a flickering street light on Nanaulu Street in Ewa Beach that turns on and off at odd intervals. Our office has reached out to the City Administration to look into the issue.



Students from Waipahu High School and Campbell High School who have been volunteering were also on site to meet with our office. Hui o Ho`ohonua is a non-profit organization founded by people living in the `Ewa community who want to restore water quality, fish ponds, and lands at the `Ewa Moku on `Oahu. The 39-acre park has important cultural sites as well as a network of fishponds that feed into Pearl Harbor, which have suffered from years of environmental neglect, illegal dumping and pollution.

Emergency Broadband Benefit https://getemergencybroadband.org/

You or your employees may be eligible for the Emergency Broadband Benefit that helps qualified people pay for residential internet service or a computer. Eligible households can receive up to \$50 a month to pay for broadband service. Those on Hawaiian Home Lands can apply for an enhanced benefit of up to \$75 per month. Qualifying households may also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 toward the purchase of a laptop, desktop computer or tablet if the household contributes a minimum of \$10 to the purchase price. The program will be available to about 200,000 qualifying households. Hawaiian Telcom and Spectrum also offer programs with low-cost or discounted internet to eligible households.

Expedited Driver's License Renewal http://www.honolulu.gov/csd

Oahu residents who need to renew driver's licenses and state identification cards over the next eight months stand to benefit from new service options being rolled out in the City and County of Honolulu. Stand-by service for customers, who are having a hard time getting appointments to renew a driver's license or state ID. is now available on a limited, first-come, firstserved basis at the Kapalama Driver Licensing Center, Kapolei Driver Licensing Center and Koolau Driver Licensing Center. There are now more than 58.000 driver's licenses. learner's permits and state IDs that expired in 2020 on Oahu and have not yet been renewed. An additional 115,110 credentials will expire in 2021, and require renewal transactions in person.

Why Budget?


Budgeting is a key public policy-making process. Because the City's financial resources are limited, the budget becomes a means for public policymakers to choose between competing requests.
