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Message from Councilmember Augie Tulba

Aloha District 9!

My staff and I are learning more each day about the concerns and issues facing our community. From tree trimming to installing speed tables, we're building relationships with City Departments to foster productive partnerships between the district, City Administration, and my office.

One issue I want to highlight is the community request to install speed calming measures on Kuhina Street. My office is working with the Department of Transportation Services (DTS) to understand the process. We learned that DTS conducted a study and found speeding on Kuhina Street, but they reported that traffic engineering devices were not warranted due to a lack of collisions in the area. For improvements, like speed cushions, DTS needs a survey or petition indicating that a significant majority (90% or more) of property owners on Kuhina Street are in favor of speed mitigations. The petition results must then be presented to the Neighborhood Board.

My office is partnering with Representative Bob McDermott and Senator Kurt Fevella, who have previously worked to gather support to address this issue. Together, we will be on Kuhina Street on Saturday, April 17th to collect signatures for the petition. We want this to be a community-based effort. If you live on Kuhina or know someone who lives on Kuhina, please contact my office to express your view on speed mitigations on the street. At Honolulu Hale, my staff and I are still learning about the City Budget process. We submitted our first round of amendments to the Budget Chair on March 19th. My office offered 55 cuts to operating budget line-items, six were accepted by the Budget Chair, and one ultimately made it to the Committee Draft 1 (CD1). The accepted cut was a line item from the Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) for \$39,459 in "non-holiday overtime pay." The DPP Director agreed that the funding was not needed at this time. The next round of amendments for the Budget Bills are due April 23rd. We will continue to keep you informed as we understand more.

For Ewa, my office submitted Capital Improvement Project (CIP) requests for baseball lights at Asing Park; speed tables along North Road; and repairs and construction at Puuloa Beach Park for the pavilion and installation of a bathroom roof.

We are learning daily about how City Hall operates so we can better assist you with your questions and concerns. If you have ideas to improve our community or know of events/activities that our office can be a part of, please email me.

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LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Councilmember Tulba is Chair of the Committee for Parks and Community Service, Vice Chair of Public Safety, and a voting member on the Committees on Housing and Economy: Executive Matters and Legal Affairs; and Transportation, Sustainability and Health. Here are some issues that he and his staff are tackling on the legislative side:

Bill 1 (2021), CD1

Allows the City and County of Honolulu to award incentive grants to developers of qualifying affordable housing projects constructed under the provisions of Chapter 42.

Bill 11 (2021) CD1

Sets the real property tax rates for Fiscal Year July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022.

Bill 89 (2020)

Allows the City and County of Honolulu to create a payment card system for use on public transit. Also makes amendments to the current fare structure. Adopted by the full council on 3/18/2021, and was approved by the Mayor on 3/31/2021.

Resolution 21-34

Urges increased flexibility for electronic participation in and public access to meetings of City and County of Honolulu Boards and Commissions, City Council, and other city agencies to increase and assure effective citizen participation. Adopted by the full council on 2/17/2021.

Resolution 21-77

Requests the city administration to develop a stream maintenance schedule for city-owned streams and floodways.

ISSUES ARISING IN DISTRICT 9

Aaron Ho District 9 Community Liaison



Aaron Ho, our office's Community Liaison, is touring District 9 with Councilmember Tulba to learn about community concerns related to city operations, property and crime. Here are some of the issues in District 9 that he is working on:

Kuhina Street Improvements

Area residents have contacted Honolulu City Councilmember Augie Tulba's office expressing concern about drivers speeding on Kuhina Street. They requested that the Department of Transportation Services install speed mitigations along Kuhina Street. To get this accomplished, the city must receive a petition indicating that a significant majority of property owners on Kuhina Street - 90% or more - are in favor.

Councilmember Tulba and his staff are working with the community in gathering support from the residents on Kuhina Street. If you are a property owner who wishes to sign the petition in favor of installing speed mitigations along Kuhina Street, please contact our office at 808-768-5009 or email atulba@honolulu.gov. Councilmember Tulba is also working with Representative Bob McDermott and Senator Kurt Fevella in getting signatures for the petition. They will be on Kuhina Street on Saturday, April 17th. Come meet the representatives and express your sentiments.

Potholes Fixed at Pu'uloa Beach Park

The city has filled several large potholes that developed throughout Puuloa Beach Park in Ewa Beach after recent heavy rains. Mahalo to the city for making these repairs when our office brought it to their attention.

Problematic Bus Stop at 'llima Intermediate School

Ilima Intermediate School expressed interest in having the bus stop fronting the school removed. Per Principal Bonilla, the bus stop in question is frequented by homeless individuals; often a site for drug use; and has required daily, early-morning cleaning of debris by school faculty and staff. He indicated that it provides a potentially damaging example for the youth attending the school. Moreover, there are convenient bus stops located within walking distance of the stop in question in both directions on Fort Weaver Road. Our office has communicated the school's concerns to the City Administration, and we are presently awaiting response from the Department of Transportation Services.

Illegal Dumping at Pu'uloa Beach Park

Concerns have been raised regarding illegal dumping at Pu'uloa Beach Park. Items have reportedly included air conditioners, large coolers, charcoal grills, mattresses and other bulky items. Our office has made frequent visits to the park and has been in communication with the City Administration regarding this issue. The City has taken action to remove the items reported.
